Whatever the outcome, however, I am proud to share with you the highlights of the past term.

I have to mention our recent OFSTED visit who judged us to be a good school with outstanding features. We have, however, never been complacent and are working on the few areas we need to develop further so that we can achieve our goal, which is to have a judgement 'Outstanding'. We already have an action plan in place to allow this to happen and are working on the areas we need to improve.

We are looking forward to a new year with more students and staff than we have ever had. Catcote Futures will at last be moving into their new Centre for Life Long Learning on the Britton site. Work will begin on the bungalow in September to allow access for all students and will be fully operational for the teaching of Life Skills later in the term. We have also acquired Hart Farm in Hart Village, this will be developed for use as a base for a Forest School and to develop both alternative and outdoor education.

The main school will receive a major face-lift over the summer. All corridors will be redecorated and carpeted, all of the BESD department will also be completely redecorated. All existing wooden windows will be replaced and the Coffee Shop conservatory will have a new roof.

Can I take this opportunity to thank you for all the support that you have given us this year, we are very fortunate to have such strong parental support.


On behalf of the staff and Governors, I hope that you have a great summer and that we all manage to find some sunshine.

# CAFE One77 ROOFTOP REVAMP

BESD wanted to enter the 'Giving Nation' awards again this year after the success of winning last year. We knew we would have to produce an excellent project so began researching ideas in the first half of the summer term.



Hartlepool Families First was eventually our chosen charity. They provide many services to the people of Hartlepool to enhance their education, health and general well-being. They give extra help to children with special needs and their families. We got in contact with them to ask if there were any projects we could volunteer on. We were told that they are currently trying to get a rooftop garden established and would we like to help. The rooftop garden project is being set up to help disadvantaged children with special needs experience gardening. The children who access the garden can grow and learn in an alternative environment. We thought that this was a great idea to become involved in.



During the second half of the summer term we spent 2 mornings a week preparing, painting and cleaning the rooftop at Café One77. We then designed murals and painted them on the walls to make the place a brighter, happier environment for the young people with special needs to work in.

We have used all 10 of Catcote's Enterprise Commandments in every aspect of this project. In addition, working with others in the community has been a very valuable lesson to learn. That experience makes it more 'real' and gives us a glimpse of how life after school will be. Our project even made it into the Hartlepool Mail.

the visit the students also got the opportunity to watch local Hip Hop Champions Ruff Diamond perform various routines.




## ADDvance into Nature

Participation in outdoor education residentials with teachers and peers reinforces a positive attitude to education and contributes significantly to the general ethos of a school. Direct experience out of doors stimulates and reinforces learning across many areas of the curriculum, and the use of the outdoors encourages young people to take greater responsibility for their own learning.

This has resulted in them gaining increased opportunities to go out socially, being safer in the community and being better prepared for life beyond Catcote School.


## NEW GARDEN OPENING

Tiff, Abbie, James, Callum, Adam, Alice, Scott, Ryan, Nathan and Brandon have worked well as a team. In year 1 they designed teatowels with students portraits on. In Year 2 they made personalised cards and notepads which were very popular with the public at the Metro Centre and with the students in school.

The student's have learned business skills while running their company and linked them to the world of work.

They enjoyed a visit to Walkers crisp factory at Peterlee. The students learned about 'operations' as they watched potatoes being loaded at one side, seeing them being peeled, fried, packaged, then boxes being loaded by a robot in the dispatch area. They also all had to experience 'quality control' by tasting a variety of crisps! Which they were glad to help with!

The students had to compile a



list of questions before the visit and found the facts and figures amazing. Ryan said " We learnt a lot of facts about crisps we never knew like at Peterlee they make 1 million packs a day".

In July Never Give Up were invited to a regional master-class competition with other special schools at Sedgefield Racecourse. They set up a trade stand, gave a powerpoint presentation and took part in a challenge to make souvenirs. Never Give Up won Best Trade Stand and won a fabulous trophy to go in the cabinet in school. The students enjoyed meeting and competing with

students from other regions and making new friends.

During the running of Never Give Up the students learned skills for the workplace while generating a healthy profit.

They paid their shareholders back with a 20% dividend for helping them to 'start up'. They then chose to reward themselves with an afternoon at 'Happy Days' ice cream parlour and a day out to Whitby. The students planned the day with a photograph shoot at the whale-bones, round to the Abbey, before a fish and chip lunch at a restaurant. Then up the 199 steps to work off the calories!

They also enjoyed a visit to the Dracula Experience and finished with an icecream along the pier.

# Community Enterprise Week

Our final enterprise week this year was named 'flagging community links'.

Each class had to select a community group or organisation to work with and represent.

A community celebration coffee morning took place, attended by parents, community groups, staff and students. The display stands were bright and colourful and showed how the links had been formed.

All classes created 2 pages of information which showed where the organisation is, opening times, price (if applicable), facilities and other information so other classes can share their links. These pages are now bound together and form a book of contact

details to use in the future. (Please ask at reception if you would like a copy).

The classes were also asked to write the impact of the week. These are their comments:-

"The impact for us at Catcote Futures is that BESD students and staff have worked with our students, staff and parents to develop our garden at the new base. Good working relationships have developed and we all have a better understanding of each others needs. We will have by the end of the project a lovely garden to enjoy outside our new Bistro."

The team work has been outstanding and I think all 10 Enterprise com-

mandments have been met.

After the students made and served afternoon tea to the residents of Laurel Gardens. We feel our links are stronger than ever.

Class 9 really enjoyed visiting parks and nature reserves within the local community however we found the paths and road crossings difficult on the way to the park. We loved Saltholme and Summerhill and look forward to visiting again.

Link 3 has worked closely with a number of community organisations (Advance to Nature, Tweddle Farm and Pony World) that work with animals in Hartlepool. It has given the students experience of being close to animals and built relationships to enable other students to visit in the future.



Link 5 looked at the new sports domes. They thought they offered some fantastic activities and we will be using the domes in the new school year in 'Be Healthy' sessions.

In Enterprise Week Class 5 pulled together a term's work in learning about gardens and allotments, culminating in a Garden Party to open the space for the classes who will use the garden in the future.



In a 'Ground Force' sort of day, we worked with 'Can Ya Dig it!' to fill the plot with vegetables. 'Can Ya Dig it' are work-

ing with students and parents next year in after school cooking sessions.

Class 2 visited three different places in the community but Saltholme was by far the best! The facilities were fantastic, we felt if we had more time we could have explored a lot more. The staff were really nice!

Link 1 worked with and visited the studios of Radio Hartlepool, to produce their very own, 1 hour long show. Radio Hartlepool were impressed with the schedule/pro-forma created by our students and have now pledged to work with other schools and give them the Catcote pro-forma to use as their template. They envisage this to be a longlasting initiative that will support community cohesion and give schools a voice. Link 1 were delighted to hear their own voices during their own show on the radio and listen to the songs they chose.

Link 2 students helped the Fairtrade foundation to update the audit of Fairtrade items in shops in Hartlepool and make a Fairtrade clock for the coffee shop. Jenny Medhurst regional fairtrade coordinator said "many thanks for inviting me to your Friday morning event there was a lovely atmosphere, and it was good to meet the students. We took £73, thanks to everyone's generous spending!"

Class 7 students and staff have enjoyed working with the young people from Hartlepool Special Needs Support Group. We have gained lots of information about the group and all the things they do. We worked really hard to organise the Strawberry tea. It went really well with lots of our family and friends attending. They had a look around the groups centre while they were there and took information leaflets away with them. I am sure we will use the facilities at the groups centre again and look forward to meeting the friends we have made again in the future.

Class 1 researched all about emergency services during this enterprise week. They had a visit from a member from coast watch and visited the local fire station. The students learnt all about how the emergency services help and support their local community.

BESD worked towards a fantastic event where a combination of elderly people, external providers (Hartlepool SEN Team, NACRO SAMHS) post 19 students and parents all met to take part in activities, look at students work, chat, create and strengthen friendships and have refreshments. The event allowed all BESD students to not only show what they are capable of but



gave everyone that real sense of community and the spirit that accompanies the development of partnerships.

Link 4 explored the Asian culture during Community Enterprise Week. The students sampled traditional cuisine and learnt about certain aspects of the Asian culture and made good contacts who they will continue to work with next year.

During enterprise week Class 4 worked with Red Dreams, a wonderful charity in Hartlepool. They have put together a short film about what we did during the week and have posted it on YouTube.

As you can see it was a very enterprising week and the very creative staff we have, had the opportunity to do something totally different.

## Class 7 and CF 7 visit Flamingo Land Resort
