Students shared their experiences of the week in a short video, promoting their message to everyone.




Poppy Carpet

Students wil take part in a virtual exercise following social distancing measures. This will be a 60 second sponsored challenge and sponsor forms will be sent out after Christmas.


The Athlete will then give interactive feedback and will talk about healthy eating, nutrition, diet and will take questions from our students.

A Little Kindness Goes a Long Way



Over the course of this term, classes have worked in pastoral groups to create a wide range of items to sell, being careful to sell their products in a variety of COVID safe ways! From using our Facebook and social media, to creating a brochure to send out. The classes have made brilliant Christmas decorations and gifts, experimenting with new techniques such as resin and the transfer machine, which has left us with some brilliant items shown below.

All students have been able to join in across the college, working in woodwork, horticulture and within the classroom.

The college also gave back to Poundland in Middleton Grange shopping centre. Poundland have been making donations to Catcote Futures for several years, providing us with lots of produce, which we use to help our Enterprise. The students have given something from each class to Poundland to thank them for the help over the years.

With the pesky COVID pandemic we have had a very different year at Catcote Futures. Where we normally pride ourselves on our innovative, wholly flexible timetable, this term students have had to stay class-based in their

bubbles. Staff have been following a recovery curriculum, this curriculum was first suggested by Professor Barry Carpenter, looked at sensitively reintroducing learners with special needs back to education, albeit through a very different way of working. The recovery curriculum consists of five pillars including repairing relationships, re-establishing a sense of community, identifying gaps in learning, re-establishing ways of learning and examining students' own needs.

This approach has meant that student anxieties have been addressed, everyone has been kept safe and meaningful learning has still been able to go ahead.

Adam from CF7 said "It's been really strange and I've missed moving about and having a choice," however, he added "I've had a great time in my new class with my new friends, and we've been very busy!"

Part of the Curriculum has been a weekly Zoom Challenge where students have been able to re-connect over the popular Zoom video conferencing app. Each week, as part of the Trust-wide Great Dream initiative, the classes have been taking part in progressive, socially or morally enhancing projects and sharing the results with their peers. This has included researching the local community, making videos about discrimination, honouring Remembrance Day or doing something to improve the local environment and more. These Zoom conferences have been well attended by students who were isolating and a great chance for peers to reconnect. Conor from CF7 said "I've really enjoyed the zoom challenges. I've learned a lot and been able to see my friends again".

While the COVID restrictions are in place, students will continue to be based in bubbles, but rest assured, as soon as it is appropriate, students will be back mixing with their peers and having a real say in the course program.
